month design process that will result in the construction of a new park on the parcel.

Once the park is completed, it will be located at the northern most part of the Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy Greenway network.

Attendees learned information relating to the design review process, shared ideas and how they can participate in shaping the park's design.

WHAT HAPPENED TO OUR RED SOX, NATION?

After 2018's record-setting season in which our Red Sox won the most regular-season games (108) in their history and then vanquished the Yankees, Astros, and Dodgers in the post-season by a combined 11-3 en route to winning the World Series, it seemed that the sky was the limit for 2019.

We had the "best" manager in Alex Cora, guiding a group of young and exciting players -- led by Mookie, J.D., Xander, Andrew, and Rafael -- as well as a pitching staff -- paced by the "unhitttable" Chris Sale -- that seemed destined to repeat as world champions.

But a funny thing happened from the end of 2018 to the beginning of 2019: Our Sox came down to earth.

When they did not re-sign their closer, Craig Kimbrel, perhaps the most essential position in baseball today, and then opened the season with a 2-8 start, it was evident that 2019 was not going to be a repeat of 2018.

Injuries piled up, pitchers went on and off the IL, and the magic of 2018 never reappeared. Mookie's ever-beaming smile had been replaced with the grimace of defeat.

As we write this, the Sox stand at 67-59, six games behind Tampa Bay in the extra wild-card spot, with Oakland in between.

In addition, they have a killer schedule in their final 36 games. And with Chris Sale essentially out for the rest of the season, the Sox' chances (which stand at 2.8 percent) of making the playoffs are shortening every day as surely as summer's fading sun. And even if they do make it, will they really be any match for any of the other playoff teams?

For young Red Sox fans, the disappointment of 2019 offers a life lesson: When you're on top, everybody wants to take you down.

For those of us who have seen this all before, the saga of the 2019 Red Sox brings to mind the line from the Impossible Dream record of the 1967 season (and yes, we still have our well-worn, vinyl album, as well as a CD of it) that has summed up so many Red Sox seasons both before and since:

When April's high aspirations, Turned to September's tears.

Let's go, Patriots!

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

When drug prices mean more than sick patients

The Department of Health and Human Services has a new plan to cut drug spending. But it's not a change for the better.

To lower spending in Medicare Part B -- the component of Medicare that covers advanced, physician-administered medicines -- the agency plans to tie U.S. drug prices to the artificially low prices paid in other countries.

This would harm patients. Price controls may save the government money in the short term, but they would slow the rate of medical progress.

In most developed countries, the government dictates the price of prescription drugs. Governments use this power

to pinch pennies, often at the expense of providing access to the newest breakthrough medicines.

Creating just a single new medicine costs an average of \$1.7 billion and can take more than a decade. And only a handful of drugs sell enough to cover their research and development costs -- much less subsidize ongoing research into new medicines.

If the government decides drug prices, drug developers will have a harder time recouping those investments -- making investment less appealing. Progress towards therapies for illnesses like Alzheimer's and cancer would slow. New drug launches would become rare.

U.S. patients currently have better access to the newest

drugs than any other country. Consider that 89 percent of 290 new drugs released between 2011 and 2018 were available in the United States at the time of their initial launch. By contrast, German patients had access to only 62 percent of these medicines.

Delayed access to new drugs is the unfortunate reality for too many people around the world. If we import their policies, we will import their diminished access to new drugs as well.

HHS's reform puts the financial interests of the federal government before the well-being of actual patients.

EMTS GRADUATED TRAINING PROGRAM

During a recent ceremony at Faneuil Hall, 15 Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) recruits graduated in front of family, friends and colleagues.

They were acknowledged for their successful completion of a vigorous post—hire training program for EMTs at Boston EMS, that encompassed 27-weeks of classroom and field training.

The graduating class will be assigned to 911 ambulances, strengthening emergency medical services in the city.

"Becoming an EMT is a noble calling of public service," Mayor Martin Walsh said.

MAYOR SUPPORTS GUN SAFETY LEGISLATION

Two hundred Mayors from across the country, including Boston Mayor Martin Walsh, have sent a letter to the Senate Majority and Minority leaders to take immediate action on bipartisan gun safety legislation that would increase gun law regulations.

"Gun reform is action we need to take now and is long overdue," Mayor Walsh said. "The Federal government has the power to enact strong and sensible gun laws, preventing tragedies from happening." In 2019, the Boston Police Department has so far removed 459 guns off Boston streets.


NEW ORANGE LINE CARS IN SERVICE

Gov. Charlie Baker and MBTA executives have introduced the first new Orange Line train comprised of six brand-new cars in regular service from Wellington Station.

MVPs were selected. In North Adams it was the George Canales Award and in the North End it was the Robert DeCristoforo Award.


Next year will mark the thirtieth anniversary of the Baseball Exchange with some great surprises in store at both locations.







On Saturday night, Montel sang his famous "This is how we do it" hit, among others to a large crowd. The Sunday Grand Procession ended with the traditional "Tug of War" (the back half won, two out of three) and the "Dance of 20 Men" to cheers from the grateful crowd.

Saint Agrippina Di Mineo was a beautiful blond princess who was unmercifully tortured to death by the Emperor Valerian in 256 AD. After her death, her body was taken from Rome to Mineo, Sicily, by three holy women; Bassa, Paula and Agatonica. The commoners were amazed by the lightweight fragranced body protected by angels and shielded by clouds. In the North End, it's 20 men that coordinate in a complex rhythm to keep the extremely heavy statue in the air. 

New car trains and construction expected to improve Orange Line

Once all the new six car trains are all placed into service, on the Orange Line, an additional 30,000 riders per day can be accommodated, according to the MBTA which officially commission the first cars in August.

"The first cars put into service is an important milestone in our administration's work to deliver a modern, reliable and safe transportation," Gov. Charlie Baker said.

Over the next several years, the MBTA is expected to significantly increase daily capacity access for people using the Red and Orange Lines, "giving more options for getting we have the need to go," the governor added.

Reportedly, the new cars will provide customers with a more comfortable and accessible ride. "Signal and infrastructure upgrades will be made to support the new vehicles," according to Lt. Gov. Karyn Polito.

"When the entire Orange Line fleet is preplace, it will carry more passages per hour than ever before and there will be shorter times between trains and customers will have more confidence that they can depend on the public transportation system to get them where they need to go," according to Transportation Secretary and CEO Stephanie Pollack.

The Administration feels that these new cars are tangible signs of progress toward building a better MBTA using a part of the \$8 billion, five-year

capital investment plan to completely rebuild the Orange Line.

The new Orange Line cars incorporate a variety of new features that improve reliability, maintainability, communications, safety, and comfort. They include more spacious interiors, LED lighting, automatic passenger counters, closed-circuit cameras and video recording, and onboard diagnostics for operators and maintenance staff. The new vehicles also feature various accessibility improvements, including wider door openings, gap mitigation devices, additional passenger emergency intercoms, more handrails, for accessible access locations per car (two more than current cars), and modern audio and visual passenger information.
